"Based on dozens of groups I've accompanied to their professional meetings, I've discovered a few common traits to make such experiences more enjoyable. Before they arrive, I try to learn as much about their countries, and their customs, as possible. Just like us, guests are encouraged to speak when someone asks about their own country. Remember, visitors to America are at first overwhelmed; having a kind, receptive listener is so important. Our American history, architecture, language quirks, and government are fascinating for visitors. Best to brush up on stories of our

own country, and read the Constitution! I try to show them parts of our region they won't necessarily see during meetings. I've directed the driver through all sorts of neighborhoods, answering questions as we go. I try to explain the history behind places we see. My first comment to our guests is, 'Everything is open to your questions. Anything you want to ask, please do so! No questions are off limits!' I learn about food requirements. I find restaurants which have, say, kosher or halal food available. Sometimes they ask where they can pray. Patience, especially with their language, is important. Although most are fluent in English, the State Department sends along a bilingual translator. In the end, I learn even more from them than they from me. You truly get a chance to make friends, often for life, one handshake at a time.
